What Every Son Needs from His Father

A father's knowledge and skills should be shared with his children at different stages of life. And at every stage of development, a child should receive a Father's Blessing. There should be 8 intentional blessings pronounced from birth to age 21. These blessings may coincide with significant events such as baptisms, graduations, weddings, baby dedications, and end of life. In addition, during the journey to adulthood, a father should provide at least 3 Rites of Passages which corresponds with the stages of increasing freedom, power, and responsibility. Below is a table the lays out chronologically the stages of development, the skills and experiences a father should provide, and the blessings and the rites that he should provide for his son.



PREPARING FOR "THE BLESSING"

You were hand selected by God to instill in your young man a sense of security, hope, and confidence that comes from experiencing the love of his heavenly Father through you. Don't worry, you don't need to be perfect, but you do need to be present and purposeful.

"The Blessing" is a simple yet beautiful ceremony that your son will never forget. The Blessing should consist of the following components:

- 1. The Gift a symbolic and personalized gift from you to your son
- 2. The Blessing a carefully crafted pronouncement of blessing to your son
- 3. The Prayer a prayer of blessing from God through you to your son

The Gift

Your symbolic gift should be age-appropriate, specific to your son's interests, and have eternal implications. It should be something of such a great value that he will always treasure it for the remainder of his life. An engraved knife would be a great gift for a 12-year-old son.

The Blessing

The blessing should communicate these three things:

- 1. I love you because...
- 2. I am proud of you because...
- 3. I see that you are on the path to becoming a fine young man; I am here for you and want to offer you my blessing for your journey.

This worksheet is meant to help you to take some time to think this through. In fact, we would encourage you to write your thoughts down in a letter and present them to him with the gift. He will cherish it for sure. But don't use the letter as a substitution for talking to him. Remember that your words don't matter as much your sincere attempt to say them. God won't let you fail in this. So, enjoy it. Your son needs to hear from the man he wants to be.

Preparing for THE BLESSING, giving out THE BLESSING, and living out THE BLESSING:

Preparing for The Blessing

Prayerfully and thoughtfully write out "THE BLESSING" for your son. Don't be in a rush. Also, write out your prayer of blessing that you will pray over him at the close of the ceremony. Plan a place and time to perform this blessing. A natural setting is best, especially late in the day, maybe after a special meal. The more special you make it the more of an impression it will make on your son.

Giving the Blessing

In the majestic setting of a wilderness canyon give the gift, pronounce "THE BLESSING", and conclude with your prayer of blessing over your son. Don't be nervous about this at all. God will give you the words and the spirit to do a great job. Over the years your son will reflect on this experience and remember it as one of the most significant things you ever did with him.

Living the Blessing

In the days that follow continue to speak words of affirmation and demonstrate unconditional to your son. Your role as a father never ends...it just changes and becomes richer as the years roll by!

Complete these three statements in a letter to your son.

1. I love you because... (fill in the blanks here.)

Sometimes Dads and sons love the same things. Sometimes they don't relate too much because of different interests, abilities, etc. However, the fact that God chose to put you two together as a father/son team is something that he might need to hear. So, you might say something to this end:



"Son, I love you because you are a gift. I am so proud that God chose ME to be your dad! He must think we make a good team and I wouldn't trade you for any other guy in the world. I love you just as you are and nothing you will ever do can change that. "You can let him know how hard it is to be a good father but that you really are trying to do your best.

Let him know that you want to be a part of his life. Make sure to say this

specifically "I know I may seem busy sometimes or not interested, but I am. You are more important than work or anything else in my life."



Let him know why you love spending time with him.

2. I am proud of you because... (focus on character quality, not achievements)

He needs to hear that you believe in him and the man he is becoming. He needs to know that you see the good in him as he is. Not that you see potential, but that you see in him

positive qualities right now. Focus on his character. The world tells them if they are good at sports, school, etc. Tell him about what you see on the inside. We have included in this packet a list of character qualities and scripture references that might give you some ideas. Character qualities such as honesty, integrity, and perseverance are some examples that you might consider. At this time you might want to also mention some character traits that are areas of growth. But speak of these in a hopeful way, as an area where God will give him victory and strength.



3. I see that you are becoming a man...

Finally, it is time to give him your blessing. This is where you tell him that you see that he is becoming a man and present to him part of his "armor". You might say something like,

"We will go through some hard times together. You may not always like me or the decisions I make, but know that everything I do, I do because

I love you. On the other side of trouble, I will always be there for you. God is making you into a great man and I see that clearly every day."

After these words, you will give him his gift. After the ceremony, you will take him off alone for a few minutes to pray for him. Don't sweat this. It is BIG deal for a boy to have his father pray over him. Just say a simple prayer asking God to help him become a man and bring you to closer together. Just speak from the heart. Then you will close your prayer with a blessing from scripture. Here are some good passages from which to choose.

• Numbers 6:24-26; 1 Thessalonians 5: 23-24; Ephesians 3:17b-19; Philippians 1:9-11



Example of THE BLESSING:

Son, first I want you to know tonight that I love you. I love you more than you can ever imagine.

The day I first heard your heart beat I knew that I would die for you. I have always loved you and nothing you can do could ever change that. I love you because you are a gift from God. I can't believe he has blessed me so much with such and incredible son. Sometimes I don't know how to say what I feel inside when I see you, but just know that I love you because you are you. You don't have to change to earn that. We are a team no matter what. I also want you to know that I am so proud of you. I see in you so many good qualities. Maybe you don't even realize they are there, but I see them every day! You are diligent and that kind of work ethic will pay off for you big time in your life. I admire that in you. I also love how you are careful with your heart and mind. You show great integrity, which means you try to do the right thing even when no one is looking. I respect you for that. You also show the true marks of a man in the courage you display. I see that sometimes things seem overwhelming for you. I hear you when you tell me that you are nervous about things, but you never let fear control you. It is ok to be afraid, but a young man faces his fear and I have seen you do that. I love that about you. You make me a very proud father.

So, it is my honor to stand here with you as your dad. You are becoming a fine young man. I see the progress you have made. I see the warrior in you. I believe in you and the man you are becoming. Sometimes, it may seem like I am too busy or interested in other things besides you. But you need to know that you are always my top priority. When things aren't going well for you, I will always be there for you. I am committed to being the best father I can possibly be, and to helping you become the warrior you were born to be. I love you son. Here is a memento to remember this occasion and THE BLESSING I give to you as my son.

Prayer for Your Son:

Father, thank you for my son. Thank you for putting him in my life. Thanks for working in his life and watching over him. I pray that you bring us closer together, bond us as a team, and help us to overcome the tough things that life will throw at us. And Father, give this boy wisdom and strength for his journey to becoming a man. So I offer him my blessing tonight, through your word in the book of Ephesians tonight: "May the Lord bless you and keep you. May the Lord make His face shine on you and be gracious unto you. May the Lord look down upon you with favor and give you peace." Amen.

The Manhood Rite of Passage @ 16 years of age

What is a Rite?

A rite is an established, ceremonial, usually religious, act. Examples of rites include initiation rites, last rites, and the rite of passage

What is a Rite of Passage?

A Rite of Passage is a special event or solemn ceremony that signifies the change of an individual's social status, such as marriage, baptism, coming of age, graduation, or inauguration. It is a ceremony that involves a significant change of status in society which occurs when an individual leaves one group to enter another.

What is a Coming of Age Rite of Passage?

The *Coming of Age Rite of Passage* signifies the transition from childhood to adulthood. While observed by many people groups and cultures for thousands of years, is largely missing from our modern world. During this presentation we will refer to the *Coming of Age Rite of Passage* as simply the "Rite of Passage".

What are some examples of the Rite of Passage?

Some Rites of Passage still exist today in various cultures, but my favorite is the *Australian Aboriginal Walkabout*. The *Walkabout* is a rite of passage during which males undergo a journey during adolescence, typically ages 10 to 16, where they live in the wilderness for a period up to six months to make the spiritual and traditional transition into manhood.

The Essential Elements of the Rite of Passage

The Rite of Passage for the Masai, the Spartans, and the Marines all share the same three essential elements or phases which are listed below...

1. <u>Separation Phase – Preparation for Manhood</u>

The young person is taken from his familiar environment to enter a different and sometimes difficult world. Separation can take many forms such as a distant journey, a struggle in the wilderness, or just a time away from parents. This is the phase where the young person is trained and prepared for the transition phase which includes the test of manhood.

2. Transition Phase – Test of Manhood

The initiate must undergo some sort of change, whether it be a trial of arms, a survival challenge, or increasing responsibility. The transition phase is the time where the participant learns the appropriate behavior for the new stage he is entering. Whatever the transition event is, the person is different when he emerges from what he was when he began. This challenge is so great that failure is a very real possibility.

3. <u>Incorporation Phase – Celebration of Manhood</u>

Finally, during incorporation, the young man or woman is welcomed back into the larger society, hopefully as a transformed person with a new sense of purpose and mission. This last phase takes place when the young person is formally admitted into the new role, and it often features a ceremony complete with gifts, blessings, and a feast.

Why do Christians not have a Rite of Passage?

Although many cultures and religions have well established rites of passage it is largely missing from the Christian faith. We have rites surrounding important events such as baptisms, weddings, funerals, etc. but nothing for a "Coming of Age" Rite of Passage. The bible does not give details of such an event, but tradition does indicate that the age of twelve is when a boy or girl becomes a young man or woman. It is the age when a boy or girl physically enters puberty, and spiritually becomes accountable for his or her actions. In the Jewish faith this ceremony is known as the Bar Mitzvah or Bat Mitzvah.

Would a Rite of Passage help prepare our young men and women for a life of success?

Absolutely! Rites of passage are typically separated into two categories... sexual and spiritual. A Christian Coming of Age Rite of Passage is a combination of both types of rites and therefore provides an even more powerful meaning to those who experience such a rite. A Rite of Passage will engage fathers in the spiritual, mental/emotional, and physical preparation of their children for the responsibilities of adulthood. Purposeful and powerful Rite of Passage experiences have the potential to increase positive outcomes in the lives of our young men and women plus keep them committed to God and the church.

How can a father prepare for a Rite of Passage?

From the earliest memories a child should be taught the truths of the Bible which should be modeled by both mother and father. A Rite of Passage is a journey over time. It consists of four stages or phases which are prepping, blessing, testing, and then finally the ceremony... the "rite". The following is a brief overview of a very challenging 7-week rite of passage provided by *Blueprint for Men Outdoors*. Only those who are exceptionally committed should attempt this Rite of Passage... but the greater the effort the greater the reward! The entire 7-week passage will involve a cohort of 4 father-son pairs.



The Four Steps in The Manhood Rite of Passage (Age 16)

7 days (Days 43-49)

Then Jesus was led by the Spirit into the wilderness... Matthew 4:4

"Through the Wilderness"... A 6-Day Wilderness Challenge:

- Schedule
 - Day 1 Travel Day
 - Day 2 Trek to Basecamp
 - Day 3 Climbing Skills
 - o Day 4 The BIG DAY... an 18-hour physical, mental, and spiritual endurance test
 - o Day 5 Solo Day... 18 hours of fasting, meditation, prayer, and reflecting
 - o Day 6 Trek Back to Trailhead
 - Day 7 Travel Day

 - Character, skills, disciplines, habits... he is prepared for manhood
